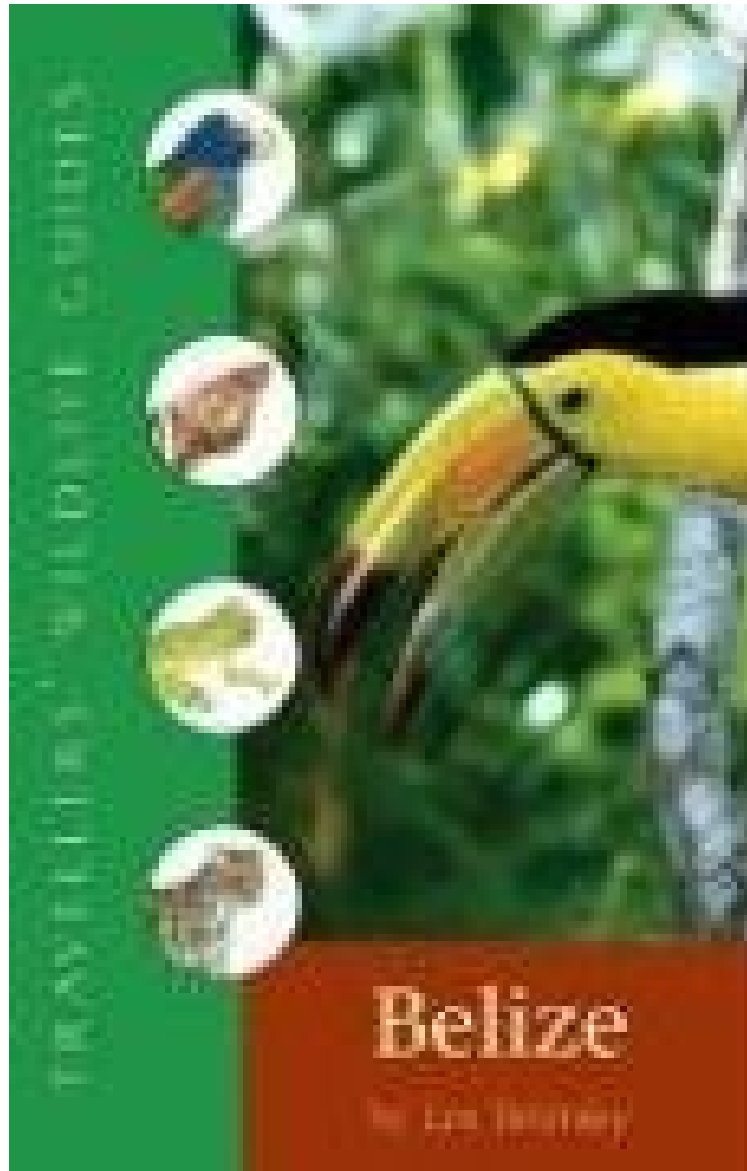

Wonderful approach to the region's natural history By LexAlexia This is a great book to read before going to the area, for an overview of its natural history. Beletsky describes each group of animals, by family or other close relationship -- its characteristics, usual habitat(s), whether ground or tree-dwelling,

life history, conservation status, etc. Then he picks out representative or common members of each group to illustrate in the color plates. Thus you can get to know the groups without being overwhelmed by the enormous numbers of species characteristic of the tropics. If you have a special interest, such as birds, you'll probably want a field guide as well, probably easier to carry certainly including more species. You'll find yourself saying, for instance, "oh, that looks like a woodcreeper," you'll know where to go in this book or another to figure out which one. I did take the book along, too, on my trip to Belize and found that it included almost all the birds and animals I saw. The illustrations are excellent. And I loved consulting it at the end of the day to learn more about the marvelous creatures I'd seen. I wholeheartedly recommend this book as preparation for identifying birds others and for going beyond ID to an understanding of how the animals fit in their habitat. 8 of 9 people found the following review helpful. Decent overall guide of wildlife in Belize By mdcgirl76 I debated between this book and the "Birds of Belize" field guide for my recent trip to Belize. I went with this one since I thought it would be nice to have a guide for wildlife other than birds and I was glad I chose this one. I used it quite a bit and was able to identify a lot of the wildlife I saw. I used it mostly for birds but I also used it to identify reptiles and some mammals. The cons: It's a heavy book. About half of the book is text - an ecological background. I didn't read it and I'm sure there is interesting info in it but not what I want in a field guide. Either remove this portion of text and have the book lighter/smaller or replace it with more plates. The plates itself aren't the easiest to follow. The organization could be better. It would also have been good to have more clues on distinguishing features of the animals, especially when you are dealing with similar looking birds. A good bird guide will give you seasonal information. Also, there is no indication of size on any of the animals, which would be extremely useful. That said, the pictures are good and for the most part, I was easily able to identify the wildlife I saw with a few flips through the book. Overall, this book is a good purchase for the amateur wildlife enthusiast and it will enhance your experience while travelling through Belize. 1 of 1 people found the following review helpful. Good identification plates for common animals By rachelc Very happy I found this book before a recent trip to Belize. I was primarily looking for a light weight guide to birds and mammals- this book is pretty bulky, so I just cut the plates out and brought them with me. They seemed like a good representation of birds (I'm a pretty novice birder, so the more common ones were sufficient). I wished there was a bit more information with the plates- particularly about their calls and range. From what I browsed the text is well written and informative. I would recommend this book for anyone with an interest in the wildlife and ecology of Belize, and bringing the plates for novice birders.
