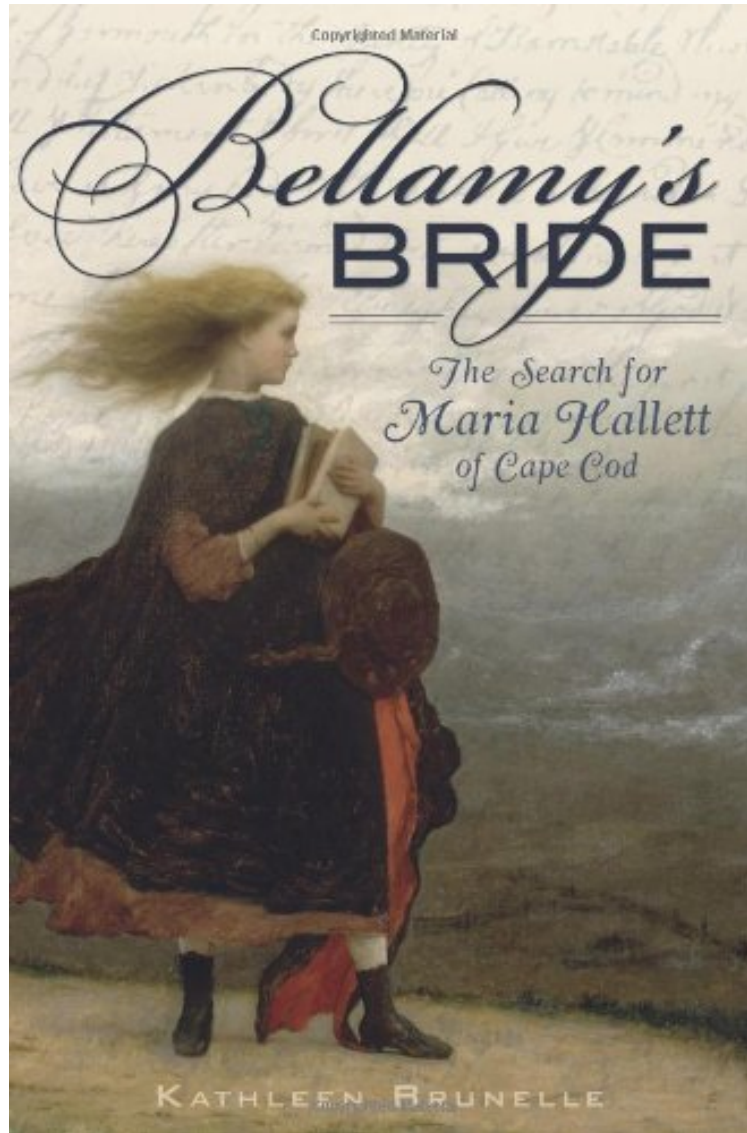

When I bought this book I thought I was going to be reading a historical fiction novel so it took me a little while to get used to the fact that it is more of a collection of the author's compiled

research on the subject. I almost selfishly wish the author would have just picked and chosen from the various accounts she heard and made one seamless story of the love affair between Maria Hallett and Sam Bellamy. I would have loved more details about Maria, but the reality is that there just isn't much documented information about her. Having said that, I still enjoyed it very much.

The legend of Maria Hallett has been passed down for over two hundred years, and Cape Cod writer Kathleen Brunelle brings a fresh breath of sea air to this epic tale in her search for Bellamy's bride.
